Select Board Meeting Tidbits

In addition to news in other pieces below, here's a rundown from the June, July & August Select Board meetings that might be of interest:

June

- At their June 16th meeting, the Board unanimously adopted the Vermont Declaration of Inclusion, adding Athens to the list of 63 towns and cities, along with organizations such as the Vermont League of Cities and Towns, and Governor Scott. The Declaration begins, “The Town of Athens condemns racism and welcomes all persons, regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, gender identity or expression, age, or disability, and wants everyone to feel safe and welcome in our community.” To learn more and read the full text

- A School Board Town Meeting was held in June where those present passed all articles related to the withdrawal of Westminster from the WNEUES District. As of July 1 Athens and Grafton will be the only members of this union district. Harold Noyes was elected to be the third representative to the new board from Athens. Grafton did not elect a third member at that time.
 - Concern was raised by the Weather Emergency Committee regarding the fact that there is not a viable plan for a cooling shelter in town for residents during the severe heat waves being forecast.
 - Lengthy discussion regarding possible policies for Driveway Access, Culvert Replacement and Maintenance. Research and further discussion will be brought up at a future meeting.
 - Town Garage access was clarified. The gate is to be closed when the town crew is not on the property. No private heavy equipment should be in the yard, and no town equipment will be used to load private vehicles. Signage will be posted and sand and mulch for residents will be made available outside the gate. Mulch is now down Miller Rd. to the back of the Town Garage property.
- #### July
- The Municipal Tax Rate was set at 1.04, down from last year's rate of 1.14.
 - The new email address for the for the Town Office is townoffice@athensvt.gov. New addresses will be forthcoming for the listers and the road foreman.
 - Health concerns were raised regarding trash accumulation on a few properties and the Health Officer was to be notified.

- The Town Meeting Survey Committee is gathering input from residents with the goal of engaging more people to attend and participate in Town Meeting.
- The Emergency Committee has cleaned, reorganized and repacked the supplies in their trailer including cots, Red Cross bedding supplies, MREs, cleaning products, paper goods, etc.
- Updated flood maps continue to be delayed and Wichie Artu has had no success in connecting with FEMA on this matter.



- A lengthy discussion addressed issues with the relationship between the Board and the Meetinghouse Committee, evident in the audio recording from the Board’s discussion at a special meeting on July 1 regarding the outstanding loan balance. The purpose of the special meeting was for approval of the first payment for the current restoration project under contract with Stebbins. Chair David Bemis apologized on behalf of the Board, and after much discussion, a plan to move forward was agreed to.
- A new policy regarding Highway Access for new or reconfigured driveways was approved. There was also a discussion on parameters for naming private roads so as to comply with the 911 system.
- It was noted that 28 names of resident dog owners were on a list of those with unregistered dogs.

August

- Repair to Mill Hill was approved for washed out areas following a recent accident.
- Hannah Regier gave an update on servicing the old safes that the Town hasn’t been able to access for roughly 30-40 years. She also noted that there is a significant need for more document storage for Town records. She found an inventory of what was in those safes as of 1992. Discussion followed about this issue and possible grants will be researched.
- Hannah reported that new highway maps are posted and 2 roads – Ober Hill and Ernst - are not accurately listed and thus are noted as not up to standard.
- Discussion continued on proceeding with Hazard Mitigation Plan. Tim Stevenson will be reaching out to Brookline about working together on the process.
- Discussion on progress for the new Community Center, along with the second annual “Untag Sale” scheduled for August 27.



- Executive session was called for a contract matter.
- Regarding highway matters, the new backhoe has arrived, BART inspected tanks at the garage and found that gauges needed to be replaced and the heating oil tank needs to be replaced. Both trucks are in need of repair but it wasn’t clear if they would be covered by warranty. Sand has been ordered, chloride has not been available.

We are grateful for the returning staff and the new staff that have joined our school team. Many of the open positions at the Grafton Elementary School have been filled. As of this writing, the school is still in the process of interviewing for a Counselor position and a Title One position.

On August 25th I had the opportunity to meet the staff and tour the school building. The custodians, Gary and Bob, have been working very hard this summer getting the building ready for the classes. Walls are painted, floors cleaned and polished, windows washed, and supplies and equipment was moved into the proper rooms for each teacher. The classrooms were very attractive and inviting, and the staff members were so friendly and enjoyable to visit with. Thank you, Angela, for organizing the “Meet the Staff” event. The staff was talking eagerly about the 2-hour school bus tour event they would be going on the next day. During this event they would be visiting families, community members, handing out goodie bags, and cookies, made by the Grafton Inn.

Planning for the new playground is in progress. The school’s playground committee and Angela have put together a plan with 6 playground structures to be added to the ones still standing, and 6 activity stations. They have secured the EESER grant Concept Approval. The committee’s next step is to look into whether the equipment and base material chosen are ADA compliant.

Save the date. 6:00 pm on Monday, September 12th there will be a community meeting at the Grafton Elementary School. We hope many of you will come join us and voice your opinions on the discussion topics that are brought up.

held in August. While we are eager to have more volunteer cooks for these, lunches will continue to be held every Wednesday at noon in the Chapel.

Food News You Can Use

Below is a list of local sites where food assistance is available at no or little cost to you. Please get the word out to your friends and neighbors about these programs as we go through these uncertain times.

Grafton Community Church Food Pantry: The food pantry at the Church is sponsoring free food pickup at the Church during the week. Staples such as pasta, tomato sauce, jam, oatmeal, and sometimes even frozen meat if available. Call Mary Feder at the Church at 843-2346 or email her at grafftonchurch@gmail.com and leave your name and phone number to arrange a pickup time and please wear a mask. Delivery can also be arranged.

Townshend Community Food Shelf: This long-time food shelf is open and providing food to those who need it. They have limited fruit, vegetables, milk, frozen meats, and fresh bread. They also have canned food, pasta, rice, and shelf stable proteins. They are located in the Townshend Church and are open every Monday from 6pm to 7:30pm. Masks requested but not essential. If you have questions call Joe Winrich at 365-4348.

Everyone Eats—Newfane: This program benefits our communities in several ways. It financially supports area restaurants and their employees, as well area farmers and other food producers. And we get to eat nutritious meals! Meals are prepared by the Newfane

Country store and distributed every Thursday from 4:30pm to 5:30pm in front of the Newfane Congregational Church. All meals are free and there is a onetime registration at the site or call Jeryl at 802-348-7173. Deliveries can also be arranged.

Meals On Wheels: Senior Solutions in Springfield, VT sponsors a Meals On Wheels program for seniors and those with disabilities. Grafton Cares provides pickup and delivery three times a week, Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. Sign up is straight forward. Call Senior Solutions Senior Helpline at 800-642-5119 for all the particulars and enjoy having meals delivered to your door in Athens and Grafton.

Veggie-van-Go: Free food is available for the month of September on the 22nd from noon to 1 PM at the Newfane Congregational Church on West St. The purpose of the program is to help people obtain fresh fruits and vegetables to sustain a healthy lifestyle. All are welcome and no proof of eligibility is required. This program is sponsored by Grace Cottage Family Health & Hospital and the Vermont Food Bank. Future dates are 10/27, 11/17 and 12/22.

Multiply Your EBT Benefits at a local Farmers Market. Do you have 3 Squares VT/SNAP benefits? When you use 3 Squares VT/SNAP or P/EBT benefits at a local farmers market, you'll now get up to \$20 match in Crop Cash for fresh fruits & veggies. That means \$10 in EBT buys \$30 of local food! The Brattleboro Area Farmers Market is open Saturdays, the Putney Farmers Market on Sundays, the Townshend Farmers Market and the Greater Falls Farmers Market in Bellows Falls are both open on Fridays. Senior Solutions: It's Time to Apply for Seasonal Fuel Assistance!

September is here – which means it is time to sign up for Vermont's Seasonal Heating Fuel Assistance Program, which can offset winter heating costs by anywhere from a few hundred to even a few thousand dollars. Senior Solutions can help you apply for assistance through Vermont's LIHEAP program, which could help lower your bills if you heat with oil, kerosene, propane, electric, coal, wood pellets, or wood.

Half of Vermont seniors who are eligible never even apply with the simple, 1-page application, leaving money on the table. Many others wait until the middle of winter, when the temperature, fuel level in the tank, and bank accounts are all running low. But by waiting until after November, even those found eligible receive only a portion of what they would otherwise be awarded.

This program is income and household-size based. If your income is at or below these levels, you qualify:

Household of 1 – 2,096/month

Household of 2 – 2,823/month

Household of 3 – 3,550/month

Household of 4 – 4,279/month

Benefits are sent directly to your fuel company on your behalf, giving you a credit for the season. In the case of wood, it will either appear on an EBT card containing a cash amount, or could be directly deposited into your bank account.

There are many misconceptions about this program: It doesn't matter if you own your home, or rent, as long as you are incurring a heating cost. It doesn't have an "asset test," so the value of your vehicles, property, and bank accounts are immaterial.

Call the Senior Solutions HelpLine at 802-885-2669 to obtain an application or receive assistance making an application over the phone, while you are still entitled to full seasonal benefits.
