Town Meeting Summary

Fifty voters attended the Athens Town Meeting Monday, March 3rd at 6 PM, and all business was dispensed in just under an hour and a half. The suggestion to move from calendar year to a fiscal year came up but was not on the warning so no further discussion was held. After questions and discussion, the budget as presented in the Town Report was amended to add an additional \$5,000 to the equipment fund for a total budget of \$759,729.42. It narrowly passed in a paper ballot by 26 to 23 with \$585,729.42 to be raised by taxes. Questions were asked about the \$77K surplus, and the purchase of a new truck. All other articles passed readily on voice vote, however, Athens voters rejected the BFUHS budget article with 25 YES and 43 NO.

All those who were running for positions on the separate Australian ballot were re-elected with a total of 70 voters participating.

Those present at Monday night's in-person meeting voted to hold the 2026 Town meeting again on the Monday before the first Tuesday in March. The



question was raised by this writer as to whether that article needs to be on the warning every year, or only if a group of voters submit a petition to change it, or if the Selectboard wishes to change it.

Select Board Meeting Tidbits

In addition to news in other pieces below, here are a few things from last month's regular Select Board meeting that might be of interest:

- There was discussion around an issue of a hemlock hedge on the Brookline Rd. which was obstructing the view of the road. After discussion it was agreed that Hannah would trim back the hedge.
- A motion was made to order the fuel injector pump for the chipper and have it installed if not over \$600. All in favor.
- Board of Civil Authority needs to appoint poll workers for 2025
- Discussion was had regarding development in floodplains and what the legal impact is on the town
- Ober Rd. project was discussed including the status of the grant application.
- Don Capponcelli was hired as the Construction Project Manager for the town garage project to be paid \$30/hour as a temporary town employee just for this project.
- A motion was made to sign weight permits for Newport Sand and Gravel and Carroll Concrete. All in favor.
- Two executive sessions took place during this meeting as well.

Athens Local Hazard Mitigation Plan

The Athens Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP) is in preliminary draft form and is now out for public comment. LHMP documents natural hazards potentially impacting Athens and gives general information about them. Some examples of hazards profiled in the plan are flooding, extreme winter storms, drought, wildfire and invasive species. The LHMP benefits the town in a variety of ways. Increasing the town's reimbursement from the state in disaster events, eligibility for mitigation grants, potentially making the town and its residents better prepared for natural hazard events and providing a series of mitigation actions the town can take. Grace Cottage Awarded \$1Million Grant

Grace Cottage Family Health and Hospital has been chosen as the recipient of a \$1 million grant to help with the construction of a new primary care clinic building through the Northern Border Regional Commission (NBRC)'s Catalyst Program. The NBRC is a Federal-State partnership for economic and community development in Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, and New York. Each year, the NBRC provides Federal funds for critical economic and community development projects throughout the

Northeast.

"We are so pleased and excited about this \$1,000,000 Catalyst Program Grant from the Northern Border Regional Commission for construction of our new primary care practice building," said Grace Cottage CEO Olivia Sweetnam. "In granting us this award, NBRC is validating and supporting what our community knows – the 14 practitioners in our primary care clinic are providing over 30,000 patient visits per year in two homes built in the 1840's, and we're bursting at the seams! We have the architectural plans in place and fundraising is progressing quickly for a 23,000 sq-ft. building to ensure that people in our rural area will get the excellent care that they need and deserve, and which they have come to expect from Grace Cottage!"



Charles Perham Journal February 1883

Transcribed by James Trimble

- 1 Have been to Bellows Falls with ½ cord of wood for Mr. Wheeler. Called to Pages. In the evening went up to Deens and paid Albert 100 toward a gun of George Pages.
- 2 At home in the forenoon. In the afternoon went up home and got a load of wood.
- 3 Stormed all day have not done much today.
- 4 To home all day.
- 5 Have been and carried Aunt Nancy up to Merrills.
- 6 Have been about home all day. Mr Woodard and Wife here just night. Went to Saxtons River with a load of wood for B Walker.
- 7 Stormy today have not done much.
- 8 To home all day have not done much. Elizabeth(his wife) has been into school today.
- 9 To home in the forenoon. In the afternoon went to Saxtons River. School Finished today.
- Have been up home and met Mr. Woodard and wife. Came back and took a load at the foot of the hill and let Mr. Cushing have it. There was .70 due.
- 11 Have been up to Frank Remmies with Ellen and Herbert. Headache today. In the evening Herbert and George Eager here.
- Have been about home today. Commenced to saw wood today. In the evening went down to Herberts to Fiddle.
- Wrote to J.R. Halcomb Cleveland Ohio. Herbert has been sawing wood. I have been splitting. Clark bill is due 9.62 paid 2.24 due 7.38.
- 14 Got started to go up home and met Mr. Woodard and wife. Came back and went up just at night and got a load for Herbert.
- 15 Have been splitting wood today. Herbert sawed. In the evening went to the dinner.
- 16 Have been up home and got ½ cord of wood and drawed home. Get it down with the oxen.
- 17 Started to go out the home place but found hard traveling so came back. Mr. Woodard here.
- To home all day. In the evening wrote to the American Steam Card Works, and Clinton Brothers company. Ellen here in the evening. I went to church with Mr. Hall.
- 19 Went up home today and took the oxen to get out wood and will stay all night.
- Have been getting out wood today and came home tonight. Drawed home a load of little wood. Went with Elizabeth and Ellen to Grafton to the ---- Eatery.
- 21 Have been to Saxtons River with Elizabeth and Alice(his daughter). Mr Woodard and wife here.
- 22 Have not done much today did not feel well.
- 23 Have been up home getting out wood with the oxen. Will stay all night.
- 24 Came home tonight. Drawed home a load of all Yellow Birch.
- 25 To home all day. Just at night went up to Frank Remmies and had my hair cut.
- 26 Have been up to Willard Whites to his birthday party.
- 27 Have sawed ½ cord of wood today. Nancy Ginny and family here in the afternoon and the evening.
- To home in the forenoon received letters. In the afternoon went to Saxtons River with a load of wood for Mr. Warner.
